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1.0 Introduction

California Public Resources Code (PRC), Sections 41730 *et seq.* require every California city and county to prepare and adopt a Non-Disposal Facility Element (NDFE) for all new non-disposal facilities, and any expansions of existing non-disposal facilities, that will be needed to implement local Source Reduction and Recycling Elements (SRREs). A non-disposal facility is defined as any solid waste facility required to obtain a state solid waste facility permit except a disposal facility or a transformation facility (PRC Section 40151).

This NDFE Amendment describes the current non-disposal facility system of the unincorporated San Diego County consisting of several material recovery facilities (MRFs), transfer stations, rural transfer stations, organic processors and construction and demolition recycling facilities. As the County develops its diversion programs, C&D and organic operations are expected to help meet the AB 939 mandates. The facilities in this NDFE include those with CIWMB SWIS numbers, proposed facilities, and facilities that do not need a CIWMB permit. These non-disposal facilities will serve as the County's core facilities to achieve its waste diversion goals of PRC Section 41780 and implement its SRRE.

A draft of this amended NDFE was submitted to the San Diego County Local Task Force (LTF) for review and comment regarding the regional impacts of the non-disposal facilities identified in this element, in accordance with the requirements of PRC Sections 41734(a) and (b).

Therefore, the County of San Diego has amended and hereby transmits to the California Integrated Waste Management Board the County's third NDFE amendment for review and approval, as required by PRC Section 41730.

As indicated by PRC Section 41735(a), the adoption or amendment of this element is not subject to environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

1.1 Changes to the NDFE

The recent construction, demolition and inert (CDI) permitting regulations (Title 14, Chapter 3, Article 5.9, Section 17381.2) and an expansion of one large wood chipping facility necessitates this NDFE amendment. Changes from the 2002 Amendment include the addition of organic processing at Enniss Enterprises Materials Division, Greenspot Recycling, San Luis Rey Downs Thoroughbred Training Center, and a proposed site at Inland Pacific Resource Recovery Highway 67 Yard. EDCO Construction/Demolition Debris Recycling (San Marcos), Iron Horse, Moody's Construction, Romero Recycling Yard are new additions under construction and demolition (C&D) processors. Also included under construction and demolition is the SANCO facility in Lemon Grove. In 2005 the County awarded a \$400,000 technical assistance grant to SANCO for the construction of a mixed C&D recycling line at its Lemon Grove facility to help the County meet its diversion goals. Several sites were deleted because they are no longer operating in the county.

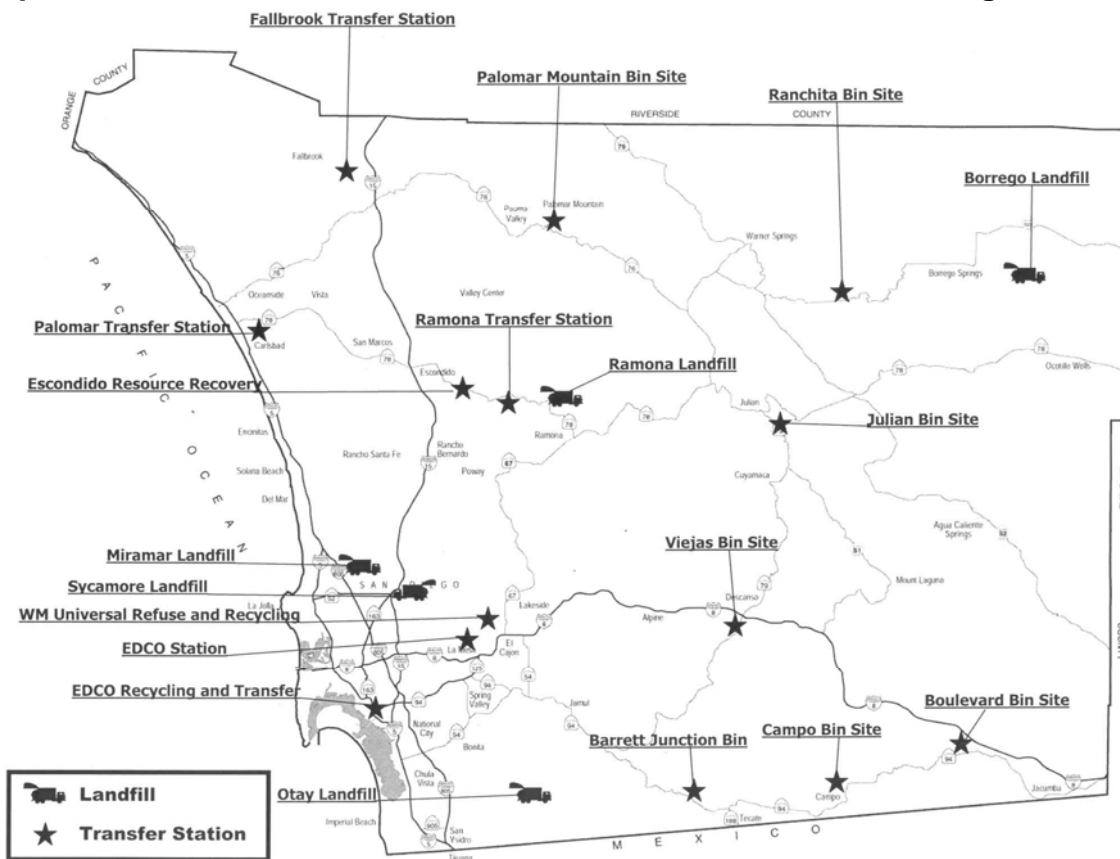
2.0 Overview of Solid Waste Management in the Unincorporated Areas of the County of San Diego

Unincorporated San Diego County has a complex network of solid waste facilities, with 29 franchised haulers and private residential and commercial self-haulers. County Ordinance 8866 requires mandatory recycling for businesses and residents, and an extensive program is in place for compliance.

Solid waste not dumped directly in the landfills in the county is deposited temporarily in several transfer and processing stations. A network of transfer stations and rural bin sites is strategically located in the remote, sparsely populated back country (Map 1). Franchised haulers provide regular curbside services in the unincorporated areas of the county. San Diego County is also establishing and supporting a small network of recycling centers located in the back country. Not counting the City of San Diego, more than 60 recycling centers presently operate in the county (Recycling Guide, County of San Diego 2004).

The remaining solid waste is picked up by various franchisers who directly divert materials, deliver recyclables to other recycling facilities, and dump the residuals in the landfills or transfer stations (Map 1).

Map 1. Landfills, Transfer Stations, and Rural Bin Sites in San Diego County



The recycling rate of facilities for the unincorporated county is determined from the quarterly reports of franchised waste haulers and transfer stations that use the facilities. Almost all of the haulers in the County divert over 5% of the unincorporated wastes they collect (Table 1). The franchised haulers transport a range of materials including residential, commercial, and roll-off boxes. Recyclable materials are collected as source separated and comingled. A significant portion of comingled recyclables from a variety of haulers goes to the material recovery facilities at EDCO San Marcos and Lemon Grove.

3.0 Facilities Included in the 2005 NDFE

The network of non-disposal facilities is integral to the collection and processing of diversion materials. Some of the facilities act only as waste collection centers for transfer to landfills, and others are also recycling centers. Some have recycling operations *en situ*, and several have recycling centers nearby. The facilities vary as to quality and quantity of materials for diversion and recycling, but comprise a significant portion of the unincorporated County's solid waste stream.

Per CIWMB requirements (Diversion Guidelines), each facility is described below in Fact Sheets. The primary categorization choice is whether or not the facility diverts more than or less than 5% of the materials.

3.1 FACILITIES DIVERTING MORE OR CAPABLE OF DIVERTING MORE THAN FIVE PERCENT OF UNINCORPORATED THROUGHPUT

NAME AND TYPE OF FACILITY	<p>The Palomar Transfer Station in Carlsbad is a large volume transfer station that receives and processes mixed waste. The site is operated by Allied Landfill Systems, Inc. The facility serves as a collection center for municipal waste generated in north San Diego County. EDCO is the County's largest recycling operation serving the unincorporated area. Five facilities exist, with diversion coming not only from the County, but other jurisdictions, including the City of San Diego. The listed EDCO operations, EDCO Station, EDCO Recovery and Transfer, Escondido Resource Recovery, and Fallbrook Recycling and Transfer may, at various times, each divert 5% or more, but they are not so required.

4.0 Organic Processing Facilities

Yard and wood waste comprised about 28% of the total waste stream into landfills in the County of San Diego in 1999 (City of San Diego Miramar Landfill Waste Composition Study). This feedstock is in great demand from the composting facilities in the county as well as by the landfill operators for ADC and beneficial reuse for slope stabilization.

The County of San Diego is working with several composters and chippers and grinders to improve and expand their operations in order to divert more of the organic fractions away from the landfills. In addition to the three major composters listed in this NDFE, the County will cooperate with other facilities in the county to improve the auditing of the organic waste and increase diversion from landfills. The County of San Diego also will work with landfill operators to increase efficiency in the use of ADC.

OVERVIEW:
January 29, 2003 (15), the Board approved and adopted the amended Non-Disposal Facility Element of the County's Integrated Waste Management Plan (Plan) for the unincorporated area of San Diego County. The Plan contains five elements: Source Reduction and Recycling Element, Household Hazardous Waste Element, Non-Disposal Facility Element, Countywide Siting Element, and a Countywide Summary Plan. The San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) Integrated Waste Management Local Task Force is responsible for review of amendments to local jurisdiction's waste management plans before submission to the California Integrated Waste Management Board.

As required by State law, the Non-Disposal Facility Element lists all facilities that a jurisdiction uses to help meet its recycling requirements. In order for a facility to obtain a state permit, it must be listed in the Non-Disposal Facility Element of the jurisdiction in which the facility is located. Steps in review include submission to the Technical and Citizen's Advisory Committees of the Local Task Force; Local Task Force recommendation to the Board of Supervisors for approval; your Board approval, and submission to the California Integrated Waste Management Board for final approval. On October 28, 2005, the Local Task Force recommended approval of the Amendments. Upon Board approval, the Non-Disposal Facility Element will be sent to the California Integrated Waste Management Board for review and approval.

This is a request to adopt a resolution amending the County of San Diego's Non-Disposal Facility Element of the County's Integrated Waste Management Plan for the unincorporated area. The Non-Disposal Facility Element amendment describes changes in the unincorporated County's infrastructure in non disposal facilities since 2003. Changes were primarily necessary to reflect permit requirements of new State construction and demolition and green waste processing regulations. On December 1, 2004 (8) your Board authorized issuance of a Request for Proposal. In June 2005 the County awarded a \$100,000 technical assistance grant to SANCU (an affiliate of LDCO) for the construction of a mixed construction and demolition recycling line at its Leuwon Grove facility to help the County meet its diversion goals. This site will be vital in the diversion of construction and demolition materials from the unincorporated areas of the county. Several sites were selected because they are no longer operating in the county.

FISCAL IMPACT:
This request has no fiscal impact. If approved, this request will result in no current year or annual costs, and will require the addition of no staff years.

WHEREAS, recent amendments to State of California construction, demolition and inert permitting regulations and an expansion of one large wood chipping facility necessitate amendments to the Non-Disposal Facility Element of the Integrated Waste Management Plan (Non-Disposal Facility Element); and

WHEREAS, since the approval of the 2002 amendments to the Non-Disposal Facility Element, the County has added four new organic processing facilities; and

WHEREAS, since the approval of the 2002 amendments to the Non-Disposal Facility Element, the County is constructing an additional site for organic processing; and
